Confession and Forgiveness

Friends, in today's scripture passage, a man named Zechariah is given good news from God and his response is to ask, "How can this be?"

Have any of you ever felt that way when receiving good news?

It can be hard to receive good news when we don't expect it.

It can be hard to accept God's grace and God's love when we think we don't deserve it.

But friends, scripture tells us over and over again of a loving, generous, and gracious God. So may we come to the prayer of confession today, not with fear, but with an awe so deep that we ask ourselves, "How can this be?"

Let us pray:

Gracious God, we are weary.

For weary bodies that ache and cry out, we pray:

Forgive us for pushing ourselves too hard.

Remind us that we deserve Sabbath rest.

For weary minds that feel overwhelmed and saturated with news, we pray:

Forgive us for creating so many distractions.

Remind us that in the quiet, we can hear you.

For weary hearts that long to feel the joy of this season, we pray:

Forgive us for being impatient with ourselves.

Remind us that healing takes time, and that joy and grief can coexist.

For the weary edges of our faith that struggle to hold onto hope,

Forgive us. Remind us of Zechariah and Elizabeth.

Remind us that your good news knows no bounds. Amen.

Family of faith,

no matter how many times we wear ourselves thin, no matter how many times we lose ourselves to distractions, no matter how many times we ask ourselves, "How can this be?" God's love keeps showing up for us.

So say this with me:

We are loved. We are claimed. We are forgiven. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Lighting of the Advent Wreath

How does a weary world hope?

By telling stories of hope, by lighting candles in the night, and planting seeds in the winter that will bloom in the spring.

By praying for children as they grow, and picking up trash on the sidewalk.

By insisting that small acts can make a difference.

There are a million ways to practice hope. So today we light the candle of hope as a reminder and a charge.

With God's help, may we bring hope into a weary world. Amen.

Thanksgiving

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise. It is indeed right to give our thanks and praise for all that we are thankful for.

In these ordinary gifts of bread and wine we receive a sacred gift and affirm that we belong to God. So with the saints before and beside us and with the angels above us, we join our voices together and say:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!

Blessed is Jesus, who walks the long and weary road of the world's suffering. On the night of his arrest, Jesus took bread and having blessed it, He broke the bread and gave it to his disciples, saying, This is my body, given to you. Do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way he took the cup having given thanks for it, He shared it with his disciples, saying, This cup is the new relationship with God. Take this and share it. Do this in remembrance of me.

Holy God, pour out your spirit upon this bread and wine, calling us into one body, sharing in your peace. Pour out your spirit on us, weaving us together in laughter and in hope, Sharing with one another in wisdom and joy.

When joy felt impossibly our of reach, Jesus became one of us and broke bread with friend and strangers.

When the weary world cried our for justice and for peace, Jesus came near to us in the offering of this cup.

Zechariah is dressed in a breastpiece, ephod, robe, checkered tunic, turban, and sash, just as the book of Exodus specifies. In my painting, gold, blue, purple, and crimson yarns are woven together and bejeweled with engraved stones which bear the names of the sons of Israel (Exodus 28:4).

Zechariah stands in the Holy Place wearing the most meticulous of garments. Does he expect to encounter the divine? Or is he just going through the motions, lighting the incense as an all-too-familiar scent fills the air?

After all these years of fulfilling priestly duties and "living blamelessly according to all the commandments and regulations of the Lord" (Luke 1:6), Zechariah and his wife are still childless. Regardless of their desire for children, in their culture and context, childlessness bore the implication of God's contempt.

I ruminated on this image... a weary priest wrapped in layered fabrics, colors, symbols, textures, and rare stones that proclaim God's providence and power. The contrast is not lost on me.

I often try to neglect my weariness by putting on a veneer of unwavering trust in God—while feeling like I may suddenly unravel into a pile of beautifully-curated threads, stones, and gold accessories.

In this image, I decided to depict the angel as smoke from the altar of incense. Zechariah has one hand over his mouth in fear and disbelief, while his other hand cradles the notion—not yet hope—of his son's existence.

Do you bind up your weariness in a neat and tidy bow, put your head down, and project okay-ness like me? What would it look like to acknowledge our weariness, quit powering through, and open ourselves up to what God might have in store for us? Perhaps we'll meet an angel. —Rev. Lauren Wright Pittman
