## **DEVOTIONS**



Read: Luke 4:18-19.

The Fourth of July provides an opportunity to focus on "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness," something that has been denied various groups of people and individuals throughout history. The pursuit of freedom and opportunity for a better life is not something new. It is the story of the exodus from Egypt for the Hebrew people (Deuteronomy 26:5-9). It is the focus of Jesus' first recorded sermon (Luke 4:18-19). Jesus promises good news for the impoverished, freedom for captives and the oppressed, and even regaining sight for those who cannot see. The good news of Jesus Christ speaks to basic human desires described in the Declaration of Independence. All of this is part of the human freedom we long for—freedom from bondage to others, freedom from want, freedom from physical limitations and illness. It is good for Christians to recall that Jesus' message is not just for a future salvation after death, but relief from life's burdens now.

*Discuss:* How does your Christian faith help you pursue life, liberty and happiness for others and yourself?

*Pray:* Liberating God, from the exodus to the cross, you have entered our lives and world to free us from bondage to sin and death; for this we thank you through Christ our Lord. Amen.

# **SERVICE**

## **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**



The Battle Hymn of the Republic, also known as Mine Eyes Have Seen the Glory, was first written as a poem by Julia Ward Howe in 1861. It has been a tradition over the years for schools and churches to sing this song during patriotic programs. In the United States, July 4th is known for the many parades and fireworks. Think or talk about July 4th traditions and memories you have from past years. Then finish by singing or saying the chorus of Mine Eyes Have Seen the Glory: "Glory, Glory Hallelujah, Glory, Glory Hallelujah, His truth is marching on."
